





The Original Gilded Age Family

The Gilder family stood at the heart of American cultural and intellectual life during the Gilded Age—a time of immense social change, artistic achievement, and political reform. At its center were Richard Watson Gilder, editor of The Century Magazine and one of the most influential voices of his time, and Helena de Kay Gilder, a pioneering artist, social reformer, and co-founder of both the Art Students League and the Society of American Artists.





Together, they created a home and legacy that championed the arts, elevated public discourse, and welcomed some of the most important thinkers, writers, and leaders of the 19th century, including Mark Twain, Grover Cleveland, and Saint-Gaudens. Their estate, Four Brooks Farm in Tyringham, Massachusetts, became a summer sanctuary for conversation, creativity, and progress.

Today, the Gilder family's story continues to inspire. Their commitment to art, literature, and civic engagement helped shape the cultural identity of America-and their legacy lives on in the people, institutions, and ideals they influenced.

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
